Real ale and cider reign, despite the rain Popular festival draws record attendance

The threat of rain failed to deter real ale and cider enthusiasts, who flocked in their droves to CAMRA's East Malling Beer and Cider Festival, held on Saturday 5 September at East Malling Research, the world-famous horticultural research station, with organisers reporting a record attendance.

The event, the sixth organised by local Real Ale and Cider campaigners at the venue, attracted nearly 1,900 visitors, enticed by the prospect of 75 different Real Ales, many brewed locally, 41 varied ciders and perries, all from Kent producers, and live music from The Bad Pandas and The Bad Pennies.

Jeff Tucker, organiser of CAMRA's East Malling Beer and Cider Festival, said: "Despite the unfavourable weather forecast, real ale and cider fans showed their continued support of the Festival. It was great to see such a large turn-out, with almost every drop of ale and cider sold by the time we called 'Last Orders'."

Ian Clennett, Chairman of Maidstone and Mid-Kent CAMRA, said: "The Festival is now well-established as a popular event for all the family, with the wonderful surroundings at East Malling Research making the perfect backdrop. We will be back on **September 3 2016** with an even bigger and better event."

'Beer of the Festival', as selected by a panel of Real Ale enthusiasts, was *Prohibition*, from *Kent Brewery* in Birling, Kent, a handful of miles from the Festival venue, with *Orkney IPA*, from *Highland Brewing Company*, in Evie, Orkney, as runner-up. *Prohibition* was also the fastest-selling beer, as drinkers rushed to sample the winning brew.

A separate panel adjudged *Brogdale Perry*, from *Tiddly Pomme* in Brogdale, as winner in the Best Cider or Perry category, with *Beardspoon Ciderfect*, from Ashford, Kent as runner-up.

A pledge by Festival organisers to donate a sum equivalent to unused drinks tokens that were returned by visitors raised over $\pounds 200$ for local charity Spadework, which provides training for disabled and disadvantaged adults for confidence and independence, through horticulture and woodwork.

Nevill Bull, Birling – Kate & Paul celebrated five years at the pub in late September with Kate's favourite singer Chris Till providing the entertainment. A *Kent Brewery* beer is now back on the pumps regularly.

Kings Arms, Boxley – Food seems very popular here. Large enclosed garden with seating. Now serving *Harveys Best Bitter, Sharp's Doom Bar, Thwaites Wainwright* and one guest ale, which was *Wadworth Horizon* at the time of a branch visit. Website: *www.thekingsarmsmaidstone.co.uk*

Kentish Quarryman, Ditton – Has discontinued real ale due to lack of drinkers but is now doing food.

King & Queen, East Malling – This is always popular as a place for a reliably good meal; it also keeps a fine choice of real ales. The tasty *Musket Fife & Drum* is now a regular, joining the other favourites *Harveys Best Bitter* and *Kent Pale*. One guest ale, often *Black Sheep Best Bitter* or a *Hook Norton* beer. Website: *www.kingandqueeneastmalling.co.uk*

Smugglers Ale House, Hawkhurst – This is the new name for the Black Pig. It is still under the same ownership but has now been given a new look with more concentration on ales and cider than on food. Beers available are *Harveys Best Bitter, Nelson Powder Monkey, Shepherd Neame Spitfire Gold, Dark Star Hophead, Larkins Traditional* and *Adnams Broadside*. For those preferring apples to hops and malt then *Angry Orchard Crisp Apple, Duddas Tun Sweet* and *Skorpion Black Cider* are offered. Opening times are from 4-11 during weekdays and 12-11 at weekends. *www.thesmugglersalehouse.co.uk*

George & Dragon, Headcorn – Fairly busy early on as Headcorn Morris were present. *Shepherd Neame Master Brew* is a mainstay here with a *Whitstable Brewery* ale on gravity that on the occasion of our branch visit was *Pearl of Kent*. The guest ale on the pump was *Yeovil Stargazer*, which was particularly tasty.

White Horse, Headcorn – Food is now available here. On a branch visit we found *Fuller's London Pride, St Austell Tribute* and guest ale *Thwaites Grouse Beater* – all in very good form.

Old Rectory, Leybourne – Part of the Spirit Group takeover by *Greene King*. Continues under the Four Square brand but with *Greene King IPA* now replacing the *Sharp's Doom Bar*.

This event is always very popular and is supported by many of the local villagers. At least 6 beers will be available: *Timothy Taylor Landlord, Fullers London Pride, Harveys Sussex Best, Locale brews Shepherd Neame Master Brew* and at least one from *Rockin' Robin.*

Admiral Gordon, Maidstone – Closed and rumoured to be yet another shop conversion.

The Cellars Alehouse, Maidstone – This new venture in the cellars of the old Style & Winch brewery is now expected to open by November. For latest information on progress see Facebook: thecellarsalehouse, Twitter: cellarsalehouse and website *www.thecellarsalehouse.co.uk*.

Chiltern Hundreds, Maidstone – Another *Greene King* takeover of a Chef & Brewer (Spirit Group) pub.

Crafty Alehouse, Maidstone – Following the end of a three month usage of the Earl Street Living Café premises a new venue is now being sought.

Feathers, Maidstone – A new Flaming Grill eating house (part of Spirit group) has opened in Lockmeadow Leisure Complex with Mark Gadson as manager. *Greene King IPA* and a guest beer on handpumps.

Hare & Hounds, Maidstone – Matt is currently stocking *Adnams Southwold Bitter* and *Fuller's London Pride*. Two additional pumps may be added later.

Oxygen, Maidstone – New name for this bar is Bar 6. No handpumps in sight when I looked in whilst workmen were operating there. Opening is expected in October. Entry will be from Bank St rather than the High St.

Sun, Maidstone – This was repossessed by Enterprise earlier in the year. There is a planning application to change the name to The Stag and redecorate the exterior of this Grade II Listed building.

Swan, Maidstone – New licensee Annie Snell held an opening night on 12 September. *Shepherd Neame Master Brew* is a permanent feature and *Late Red* is the seasonal ale. Now on Facebook: *swanmaidstone* and has a website: *www.swanmaidstone.co.uk*.

Marden Club, Marden – Now opens at 5pm on Fridays to get the weekend going slightly earlier.

Queens Head, Mereworth – This pub is being advertised for sale with vacant possession. It has recently been placed on the Community Assets List as an Asset of Community Value (ACV) to help preserve it as a pub.

Yew Tree, Sandling – Now has five pumps with *Dark Star Hophead, St Austell Tribute* and *Young's Bitter* as regulars and two guests which were *Adnams Lighthouse* and *Bath Ales Barnsey* when branch members visited in September. The garden alterations have been completed with plenty of seating.

Bull, Snodland – Sadly, Tonbridge & Malling Council has allowed the Co-op to convert this pub for use as a shop leaving only just two pubs, the **Monks Head** and the **Freemasons**, for social use in this rapidly expanding town.

Clothworkers, Sutton Valence – Lisa Rand (previously at White Hart, Claygate) took over at this Shepherd Neame pub in August, just two days before a branch visit. The four beers were found to be in very good condition. *Master Brew, Whitstable Bay Pale Ale* are regulars with a seasonal and a guest.

Teston Club, Teston – Damian is putting on some excellent choices here with *Theakstons Grouse Beater* and *Wadworth Farmers Glory* on the bar during a branch visit. Rewiring and decoration were in progress then.

Royal Paper Mill, Tovil – *Goacher's* closest pub to the brewery; it usually offers *Fine Light* on pump, *Best Dark, Real Mild* and *Gold Star* on gravity dispense, and at least one more from *Goacher's* portfolio: *Silver Star, Crown Imperial Stout* or *Old 1066*. Handily placed if shopping at the nearby grocery store.



Plough, Trottiscliffe – Following a management change the Plough has had an extensive refurbishment by new licensees Julie and Dimitris Mitrica, with much lighter colours of white and pale green. The exterior now has a terrace with a pergola, which may be covered. The pub offers Greek, Mediterranean and traditional English meals, all made from fresh ingredients. The well liked *Harveys Best Bitter* remains on the bar, and *Otter Ale* was proving popular.

Bell, Ware Street – Nigel Williams held a beer festival here for August Bank Holiday, which most active branch members unfortunately were

unable to attend due to previous commitments; however, reports were favourable.

North Pole, Wateringbury – Business had suffered here during the protracted roadworks in East Malling, but we had a visit during this period and thus lent a little help by drinking some ales. *Greene King IPA* and *Sharp's Doom Bar* are the regular beers but the more interesting guest, *Caledonian Edinburgh Castle*, was particularly appreciated by our members. *www.northpolewateringbury.co.uk*

Wateringbury, **Wateringbury** – Part of the Spirit Group takeover by *Greene King*. However, the beers on offer here have included *Musket Muzzleloader*, *Cotleigh Barn Owl* and *Westerham Summer Perle*, so let us hope the choice continues.

Newnham Court, Weavering – Another *Greene King* takeover of a Spirit Group pub.

Good Intent, West Farleigh – Pauline & Steve held a beer festival here over the Late August Bank Holiday, which members attending found had a good selection of beers in fine condition.

Tickled Trout, West Farleigh – Taken over by Hush Heath Estate which also own the **Goudhurst Inn**. Was re-fitted mid-September, so should be re-opening soon.

Anchor, Yalding – This pub has now re-opened following the sale to *Shepherd Neame* and had a subsequent refit. No reports received as yet.

Blandford Forum

Back in late June I decided to visit Blandford Forum in Dorset to check out the real ale scene in the town. A town of over 10,000 inhabitants, it is home to *Hall and Woodhouse*, which, surprisingly, compared with other breweries, has very few tied houses in the town. The first pub, the **Greyhound**, a split level old coaching inn, is tied to H & W, and had on *First Call, Tanglefoot*, and *Firkin Fox*. The first of the day in here was *First Call*. It was then over the road to the **Crown Hotel**, another tied house. Although allegedly the oldest inn in Dorset, the hotel was well up to date on its pricing structure, with a pint of *Firkin Fox* costing £3.90, but a half being marked up to £2.10! The other beers here were the same as the **Greyhound**. Next it was over the road to the **Crown & Anchor**. I was expecting more interesting beers than the ubiquitous *Doom Bar* and *London Pride* that were on offer, but the chat with the customers made up for it, and were more than happy to help me with directions to the remaining pubs on my list. I then headed off up the hill to the **Kings Arms Hotel**, a freehouse serving *St.Austell Tribute* and *Butcombe Bitter*. I opted for the *Butcombe*! It was then a short walk to the **Wheatsheaf**, as I was too early for **Nelson's Alehouse**, which was not open until 2pm.

I had already learnt that the Wheatsheaf, a community wet-led pub currently under an ACV, was being disposed of by H & W, and felt saddened to hear that the pub was due to close in August. It may be no more by the time you read this, but the locals had already raised two thirds of the asking price. The beer in here was First Call. From there it was back downhill to the Railway, for which, as there was a 'for sale' sign outside, I didn't hold out much hope for real ale. How wrong could I have been? In all honesty, the pub should be in the *GBG*. Having not planned the trip, I was taken aback to find the pub serving ales from Palmers, Hop Back, Gyle 59, Otter, Sharps and Eight Arch Brewery of Wimbourne, all, due to Happy Hours on Fridays, at a bargain price of £2.40 regardless of strength. Oh, I forgot to mention the 30 odd ciders on sale! I opted for the Parabolic from Eight Arch, then a Starstruck from Gyle 59, and quickly got chatting with the landlord, Nigel. He's been in the pub for 12 years, and seen his savings go into keeping the pub afloat, and thinks now is the time to sell up. "People no longer come out for a drink in Blandford, and the scrapping of the late bus into Poole (last bus now is 17.50, last train left in 1966) means the town is now an island community as far as public transport goes", he tells me. I decided to stay for a pint of cider, and Nigel gave a quick tour of the impressive pub cellar.

Due to my over-indulgence in the **Railway**, it was now a whistle stop tour of the remaining three pubs. First it was then back to the late opening **Nelson**, where I found *Ringwood Best*. My penultimate pub was the **Dolphin**, a *Piddle* tied house. My notes on the beer sampled in here are lost in time. Then it was over the River Stour to the last port of call, the **Stour Inn**, this being the brewery tap. By now it was getting close to the last bus to Poole, and *Tanglefoot* was the beer of choice in here. An enjoyable day out, although not easy, transport-wise, from Dartford!

As an addendum to this piece, it was a huge coincidence to have met Nigel in the **Firkin Shed** micropub in Bournemouth, just as I was telling the landlord of the **Firkin Shed** about the **Railway**, after the airshow in August. He informed me that both the **Wheatsheaf** and the **Railway** were closing at the end of August.



I've recently received my copy of the 2016 *Good Beer Guide*, which has a colossal 1,018 pages, of which more than a quarter (273 pages) is devoted to the brewery section detailing over 1,400 breweries and over 7,000 different real ales brewed regularly. This underlines the ever growing trend of improving choice of real ale, which could not have been envisaged in the early years of CAMRA in the 1970s. The first *GBG* to identify different beers was 1976 when about 300 real ales were regularly available from just 150 breweries. In my opinion the general quality and styles of beer have also improved greatly since the early days.

The 2016 *GBG* also includes a larger number of micropubs than previous editions, reflecting the ever growing number of these small outlets in the country, Kent in particular, and their ability to offer excellent quality ales predominantly from small scale local breweries. However, Gravesend & Darent Valley branch still only has one micropub, the **Compass Ale House** in Gravesend, which deservedly appears in the 2016 *GBG*. We eagerly await another such pub locally but there is nothing in the pipeline; unless any reader knows otherwise?

GDV branch is better represented with small breweries, with *Millis Brewing* in South Darenth and *Caveman* in Swanscombe being joined this year by *Brew Buddies Microbrewery*, located near Highlands Farm in Swanley Village. *Brew Buddies* first brewed in June 2015 and their first outlet was **Orpington Liberal Club**. Details of their unfined beers and initial outlets can be found on *www.brew-buddies.co.uk*, Twitter and Facebook. I've sampled and enjoyed both *Mosaic Pale Ale SH01* and *Session Pale Ale PA01* at **Dartford Working Men's Club**.

Another pleasing trend is the increasing number of pubs hosting beer festivals. As mentioned in issue 179 we don't always hear about them in time to publish in the *Draught Copy* festivals page, but we will promote pub festivals in our area and adjacent areas on the GDV website festival page, so could licensees please inform us in good time.

The only two pub festivals I've managed to attend this summer were in August. I was very impressed with the layout of the temporary bar in the rear garden area of the **Cricketers** in Meopham, opposite the village cricket green. The beers we drank were in excellent condition; my half

pints were *Canterbury Ales Merchants Ale, Bexley Gold Sovereign, Westerham Vic Secret* and *Wantsum Dynamo* from a choice of twenty ales, mostly from small Kent breweries. I also paid a flying visit to the **Three Daws** in Gravesend, which is a new entry in the 2016 *GBG*. As I was driving and only had a one hour ticket in the nearby car park, I had just enough time to enjoy halves of *Old Dairy Gold Top, Truman's Lazarus* and *Turner's American Pale Ale*.

I've heard good reports from friends visiting festivals at the Ship at Southfleet, the Windmill in Gravesend and the George & Dragon at Swanscombe. I also missed the August Bank Holiday weekend festival at the Anchor & Hope in Ash, which featured 15 real ales, all from brewers in Kent, plus ciders. Just before the festival I paid the **Anchor & Hope** a long overdue visit and was impressed with the display of pump clips above the bar displaying previous guest beers. There are usually four real ales on handpump and I tried Robinsons Twisted Sister. The pub has a good reputation for meals; the Tuesday tapas offer looked inviting, and I shall definitely return. That evening I also paid overdue visits to the White Swan in Ash, where I had a palatable half of Adnams Topaz, and the Rising Sun at Fawkham Green where I had a discount price half of Westerham Alsace Blonde, which was not to my palate. Nevertheless I'm pleased to report that these pubs, and others I visit occasionally, usually offer at least one beer outside the standard range, and often real ales from Kent.

Occasional visits include the **Pied Bull** at Farningham, which served me a very good pint of *Thwaites Wainwright* recently, the other guest beer being *Butcombe Bitter* alongside the resident *Greene King IPA* and *Courage Directors*. At the other end of the village, the **Chequers** served me a pint of excellent quality *Crouch Vale Citra*. Their regular beers are *Fullers ESB*, *London Pride*, *Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter* and *Timothy Taylor Landlord*.

Some *Shepherd Neame* tied houses are permitted to sell beers from other breweries, such as the **Chequers** at Heaverham, mentioned in the previous issue. Liz at the **Lamb** in Swanley Village does not have this privilege, but I can vouch for the good quality of the *Shepherd Neame* beers, *Master Brew* and *Whitstable Bay*, in this cosy, friendly pub. Unfortunately, the **Lamb** cannot take beers from the very local *Brew Buddies*, but I trust other pubs in the area will give them a try.

Another *Shepherd Neame* tied house, the **Rose & Crown** in Wrotham was selling *Master Brew* and *Whitstable Bay* and a guest best from *Hydes*

brewery in Manchester named *Paddock Wood Bitter*, 4.2% ABV, a chestnut coloured ale brewed with Kent Goldings hops. Interesting that a northern brewer with regular beers proudly named *Manchester Mild* and *Manchester's Finest* should create a beer with Kent connections. Also in Wrotham is the **George & Dragon**, a village local with an ever changing range of beers in good condition. *Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter* is a regular feature and the guest beers were *Marstons New World*, *Moorhouses Blonde Witch*, *Wells Bombardier* and *Young's Hummingbird* on a recent visit.

Subsequent to writing this article, the seasonal green-hopped beers will be available during late September and early October and will probably have finished by the time you read these notes. The **Padwell Arms** in Stone Street, near Sevenoaks is due to hold a Green Hop beer festival in mid October, showcasing green hop ales from many breweries in Kent. This pub regularly sells beers from Kent breweries; *Larkins Traditional* and *Grumpy Git*, brewed by *Larkins* exclusively for the **Padwell Arms**, are permanent fixtures. *Ripple Steam, Rockin' Robin and Tonbridge* breweries are strongly represented with changing beers. *Cottage Brewery* from Somerset supplies the only regularly featured "foreign" beers.

One item of distressing news is that the **Crown** at Otford, a recent *GBG*listed pub, was closed at the time of writing. Mark and Fiona had run this pub admirably for at least ten years, building up a good reputation for high quality food and drink and a focus for various community activities - notably several darts teams. We were aware that they were planning to leave the pub during the summer but not as early as July. There had been rumours about conversion into an upmarket restaurant, but subsequently we understand that the **Crown** has re-opened as a pub in late September, although its long-term future is still uncertain.

It'll soon be time for Christmas and we'd like to mention two branch events in December. Firstly card-carrying *CAMRA* members are invited to attend the branch AGM, which will be held at the **Malt Shovel** in Dartford on Wednesday 2nd December. Secondly, for the second year running and by popular demand, the Christmas social and buffet will be held at the **Coach & Horses** in Northfleet for members and friends on the evening of Friday 11th December.

Enjoy the festive season and best wishes for 2016.

Paphos and Aphrodite's Rock

DRINKING IN CYPRUS doesn't necessarily mean drinking cold fizzy *Keo* lager, as I found out while on holiday in Paphos in August 2015. After some prior investigation, I found there to be a microbrewery on the outskirts of Paphos. I popped along on a couple of occasions to the *Aphrodite's Rock Brewery*. The owner Bill, an ex-navy man, spoke about the problems that they had encountered since proposing a new brewery over three years ago. The main stumbling block, it appeared, was the constant objections made by the main player in Cyprus, *Keo*, which is 70 percent owned by the Greek

Orthodox Church.

Since overcoming those difficulties and other government red tape in 2013, the brewery is now fully up and running, supplying over 50 premises in and around Paphos (mostly with bottled beers, although there are 3 outlets serving cask ale in central Paphos) plus various other outlets around Cyprus including the British Bases. Their core range of beers is: *Yorkshire Rose* 3.8%, *London Porter* 4.5%, *Lian Shee Irish Red* 4.5%, *ESB* 5.0% and *West Coast IPA* 6.0%. I don't need to state that all of the beers were sampled at the brewery bar!

They also had in post at the time a contract German brewer (Melanie has since returned after maternity leave) and now have their own lager. I also learnt that they have branched out to cider production, using juice sourced from Poland, but presently these are bottled brands. A worthwhile trip out from Paphos! *www.aphroditesrock.com.cy*

There are seven outlets for cask beer in the Paphos area, with these three being in or close to the centre:

DT's Sunset Bar, Tomb of the Kings Avenue – as I remember, *Yorkshire Rose* and *ESB* were on offer here. Good food, a quiz Tuesdays and curry night Sundays in this bar that caters for both holidaymakers and ex-pats alike.

The Rugby Arms, Ikarou Street – open since 2007; unsurprisingly enough, the landlord here is a huge rugby fan. Unfortunately I couldn't comment on the beer here, *Yorkshire Rose*, as it had just run out!

The Old Fishing Shack, Tefkrou Street - what's not to like about this place, a beer lovers' emporium? Athos has been running this bar for ages, and still has an old What's Brewing from 25 years ago with a very young picture of himself in an article written about the pub. Beers on handpump here were West Coast IPA and London Porter, and it looks



like *ESB* has been added since our visit, although during the really hot summer not all will be available. *Old Rosie* was also served from a pin at the rear, and Athos produces fruit ciders that have been really popular (like in this country they seem to be *en vogue* at present) using real fruit with *Old Rosie* as a base. And I almost forgot to mention that over 200 bottled beers are in stock. A real must to visit when in Paphos.

Also present were these former branch members: Cynthia Robertson, Barry Stiff, Dave Frost, Mary Baker, Jackie and Andy Malpress, John Simpson and Gill Bellamy. The branch sponsored a fine buffet that was magnificently presented by landlord Jonah and his team. And of course some fine ales aided the celebration, led by (in your editor's opinion) a very moreish green hop ale by *Shepherd Neame*, *Tallyman's Special* 4.5% ABV, made with Canterbury Whitebine hops.

We therefore started at the next pub on our list, the Good Beer Guide-listed Prince of Wales, which is just across the road; here they had three real ales plus a cider. There were four Bexley members and two South East London members on the crawl. From here we walked round the corner to our next stop the Victoria, which had just a single ale available. Onwards then to the Fox and a choice of four ales to go at, three from the Wells & Youngs stable plus the ubiquitous Doom Bar. Our last stop in Upper Belvedere was the Royal Standard, which has gone from two to three real ales since our last visit, including a Ringwood ale. Next it was down the hill to Lower Belvedere and the Belvedere Hotel. Unfortunately, upon our arrival, the Spitfire ran out and again the next barrel was not ready for consumption and so we made a hasty departure. Our final stop was the Morgan. This is a recently opened Marstons establishment which carries four beers from its stable. Sadly, we had to return one of them, but in general the quality was as high as it had been for the most part of the crawl. Some of the group also chose to eat here and I must say that the carvery looked great.

At the end of July we also held a social at the Welling Round Table Beer Festival held in the garden at the **Guy Earl of Warwick**. The festival is in its fourth year and has been a success each year. Beer quality is good and it is a shame that the same cannot be said for the beer in the pub itself.

In August, we held our social at the Door Hinge to present Ray with the Pub of the Year runner-up certificate. As always, he did us proud with four ales from all parts of the country and a nice spread of sandwiches. Due to the lack of time available, none of the members went on as planned to the New Cross Turnpike. Also in August we attended the Old Dartfordians Beer Festival on the Saturday of the bank holiday weekend. For once the weather was fine early in the afternoon and we were able to enjoy the beers without getting soaked every time we needed to go out and fetch the next one, although by the end of the afternoon the usual monsoon conditions had arrived. Because of a change in the rules, from next year Old Dartfordians will be classed as a pub and not a club when it comes to the CAMRA competitions and so we will be including them in the voting for our Pub of the Year. Finally that month, a few of us joined the annual Gravesend branch seaside crawl on bank holiday Monday. This year it was to Dover and as always I would like to thank Mick Norman for organising a wonderful day out around the pubs.

In September we presented the beer of the festival certificate to Cliff at *Bexley Brewery* on their first birthday weekend. He was naturally thrilled with his award, presented to him by branch chairman Martyn Nicholls.

Lastly in September, our social was held in the **Wrong 'Un** to present them with the Pub of the Year third place certificate. A fine array of beers was available for us to try.

Richard Reeve, a member from Enfield & Barnet CAMRA, is completing his round-Britain cycling trip to all 100 micropubs in the country on November 14. Doris's Day

You just have to mention 'Doris' to most CAMRA members in Kent and they will know who you mean! Doris Jemison, now in her late-eighties, is one of the longest-serving licensees in the county, at the helm of one of the most interesting, unspoilt pubs: the **Red Lion** at Snargate on Romney Marsh.

The pub has been in the family for more than 100 years, and has lots of WW2 memorabilia, wonderful locals, and interesting décor, not to mention outside toilets! The pub is ably looked after these days by the younger generations of the family, but Doris still puts in an appearance.



In July, Doris was presented with two certificates, one for being Ashford CAMRA Pub of the Year and one for 30 consecutive years in the *Good Beer Guide*. The *Guide's* editor and well-known beer writer, Roger Protz, no less, was in attendance to perform the ceremony.

A small group from Maidstone had made the trip but we were surprised to see a queue out of the front door just after opening time. With a fantastic turnout from far and wide, one of the customers had brought along loads of cheese from his shop for everyone to share – delicious! Snargate has a bus service – just about! The morning 11B bus to Ashford leaves well before the pub opens, but the reverse journey gets to the pub at about 1.40 in the week, and 3.40 on Saturdays.

Most other journeys on the 11 route serve the next village of Brenzett, which is a 30-minute walk avoiding the main road. The bus drops you off by the old Fleur-de-Lys pub (long closed). Head north for a few hundred yards, then turn left on the lane. After about half a mile, there is a right-hand bend, and a wide trackway heading off to the left, but no footpath sign, which doesn't help.

This grassy track leads to Snargate church, and the **Red Lion** is just to the left. On Saturdays it makes sense to walk from Brenzett then catch the bus opposite the pub. In the week you can either get off at the pub and walk to Brenzett or vice versa, as the pub is open from 12-3 at lunchtimes (but not Mondays).

The **Red Lion** is one of those pubs you have to go to at least once in your life. The beers (normally 3 or 4) are served direct from the cask. Congratulations, Doris, and long may the pub continue.

Here's what's happening on Kent's Hop Farms

Endeavour has been bred by Wye Hops as a low trellis, hedgerow hop. As brewers look for new zesty hops to try, this gives a blackcurranty, spicy edge to the beer. It's now being grown on 3 farms in Kent, plus more in Hereford and Worcester. Hop maestro, Dr. Peter Darby, who runs Wye Hops, also has imported Cascade from the US, and the new plants have established on a few farms. Additionally, he has bred Boadicea (spicy floral), First Gold (orange marmalade), Pilgrim (citrus, pears) and Sovereign (herbal, floral, earthy).

Several growers have tried their own hand at selecting new varieties. Peter Cyster from Northiam in Sussex has cultivated the Sussex Hop (earthy, grassy, minty), which is now growing on 2 farms in Sussex. Sandhurst grower, Chris Nicholas, found Epic (fruity slightly herbal) growing in a hedge; Epic is now brewed into an excellent beer by *Tonbridge Brewery*. Hereford and Worcester growers have selected Archer (floral, lime, peach), Jester (grapefruit, tropical fruit) and Minstrel (spicy, berries, orangey).

There is still the main acreage grown of standard UK varieties: Fuggles, Goldings, Challenger, Northdown, Target, Admiral, *etc.*, but there has been a revival of some that were starting to disappear. Bramling Cross (spicy, blackcurrant), Progress (sweet floral minty), Whitbread Golding Variety or WGV (spicy floral herbal).

This has encouraged growers to look even further back, and gardens of **Bullion** (strong zesty blackcurrant) and **Keyworths** (citrus, blackcurrant) have been planted. These hops were developed by Prof. Ernest Salmon of Wye Hops Research in the 40s and 50s as early Verticillium Wilttolerant varieties. Peter Darby has a small historical garden with many of the original varieties that Hop Research and Wye Hops have bred over the years, and there is the National Hop Collection homed by *Shepherd Neame* at Queen Court Farm, Faversham. Peter Darby has been reassessing these collections for use in ales.

Professor Salmon started Hop Research at Wye College in 1906. The work he began there has become the foundation for all hop breeding worldwide until the present day. Salmon's last variety, code named OZ97a, is in that collection. It was rejected by brewers in 1960 after going to farm trials because it had a coarse flavour. After a small trial brewed by *Foundry Brew Pub*, Canterbury, it was described as complex, fruity with apricot citrus and spice. It is now established on 2 farms, so look out for brews that include it. As it takes 3 years to establish a productive hop garden, it will still be a rarity for a while.

There are many different hops from England and around the world that make such a great choice of different beers for us to drink. It is an interesting pastime to identify different characteristics and guess what variety of hops or even which country the hops in your beer came from.


