A recent branch visit to the Kent Brewery in Birling allowed us to make a presentation that was long overdue. The 2013 **East Malling Beer and Cider Festival** had voted Kent's **Black Gold** as Beer of the Festival, and Maidstone chairman, Jeff Tucker, went along with the framed certificate that marks the award. Paul Herbert and Toby Simmonds greeted us and quickly ensured that we had glasses in hand ready to quench our thirst with Pale and Black Gold.



During the informal ceremony, Toby and Paul were also celebrating the fact that **Twelfth Night**, their 7.4 percent barley wine, had won Gold at the Champion Beer of Britain regional final for London and the South East, and would therefore be available at this year's Great British Beer Festival in August.





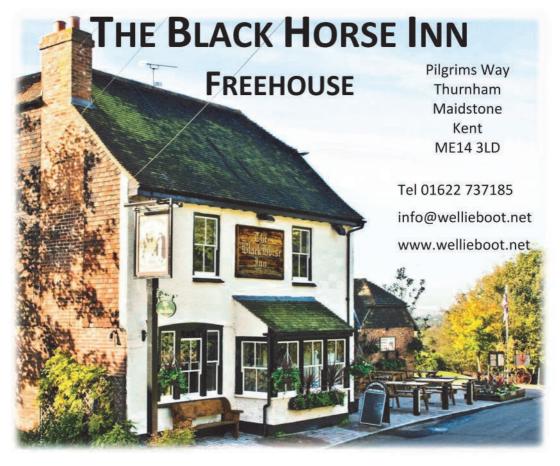

CAMRA Approves Cider Duty Freeze

CAMRA has welcomed the Government's decision in the Budget to freeze cider duty. Making the announcement, the Chancellor highlighted that some cider producers in the West Country had been hit hard by recent weather conditions so needed additional support. The freeze in duty will apply to cider with a juice content of 35% or higher, and will not apply to sparkling cider between 5.5% and 8.5% abv.

CAMRA has cautioned that small cider producers (making below 70 hectolitres each year) already pay no duty, so the benefit of this duty freeze will primarily be felt by slightly larger producers. CAMRA is continuing to campaign for a new cider duty system to support real cider with a considerably higher juice content. 



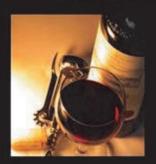

Nevill Bull, Birling – Meet the Brewer events have been taking place here allowing the drinkers to express their appreciation (or otherwise) of the brews available. Paul Bournazian of *Tonbridge Brewery* (now based in East Peckham) and his business partner Mark set us a task of identifying five different hops used in his brews. Most of us fared badly



but the winner got three from five correct and was duly rewarded with an eight pint minicask of *Coppernob*. The beers on that evening were *Alsace Gold, Coppernob* and *Rustic. www.nevillbull.co.uk*

Cock Inn, Boughton Monchelsea – Jo & Dave Whitehurst were our hosts for this year's post-Christmas meal. We were well looked after with good meals, prompt service and excellent beer as always. Everyone departed well fed and supplied with a plentiful selection of beer. Shepherd Neame Master Brew, Spitfire, Whitstable Bay Pale Ale and India Pale Ale were available all evening with the seasonal Amber coming on at the end to replace the Whitstable Bay which we had exhausted. cockinnmaidstone.co.uk

Walnut Tree, East Farleigh – This excellent *Shepherd Neame* tied pub provided us with *Master Brew, Whitstable Bay Pale Ale* and the seasonal *Amber Ale*. On Saturday evenings live music is played. There is a large car park and garden at the rear. A quiz is held on Wednesday evenings. Food is available daily except on Wednesdays.

Roebuck, Harrietsham – Just off the A20 is this spacious pub with accommodation. A new brasserie style menu is now available. A reporter found two *Goacher's* ales here, *Best Dark* and *Special* (badged as *Roebuck*); guest ales at the time were *Robinsons Hannibal's Nectar* and *Sharp's Doom Bar. www.theroebuckinnharry.co.uk*

Hawkenbury, Hawkenbury – Situated on the road between Staplehurst and Sutton Valence, this pub has a good sized restaurant with facilities for darts, pool and table football. It is licensed for marriages and caters for weddings. It also has an accommodation block at the rear. We found Goody Ales Good Heavens and Good Life with Millis Dartford Wobbler all as guests. www.thehawkenbury.com

Eight Bells, Hawkhurst – New licensees took over here in December. *Dark Star Hophead* and *Harveys Sussex Best Bitter* are continuing as regular ales and *Skinners Betty Stogs* has been found as a guest.

Dirty Habit, Hollingbourne – Very busy serving diners on our visit, so rather than propping up the bar, we lingered only for the one drink. *Harveys Sussex Best Bitter, Sharp's Doom Bar* and *Tim Taylor Landlord* are the regulars and the guest was *Musket Flintlock*. www.elitepubs.com/the_dirtyhabit

Sugar Loaves, Hollingbourne – Our scheduled visit here failed when it was found closed with no explanation on the door, although it was occupied.

Windmill, Hollingbourne – Some diners still remaining but no problem with seating was found here. Musket Flintlock (in good order and very popular) and Sharp's Doom Bar (not sampled) are regulars with Harveys Sussex Best Bitter and Westerham Grasshopper Kentish Bitter as a guest. www.thewindmillbyrichardphillips.co.uk



Hook & Hatchet, Hucking – Good news here, in that David & Charlotte Bacon have now taken this on. It had been closed for around a year but is now due to re-open on 22 March following considerable renovation.

Drakes, Maidstone – Work is now currently under way here with scaffolding in use, so may open late May.

Poppy Fields, Maidstone – Duly opened on 10 March and was very busy. The offer of free beer may have helped. Reasonably close to bus stops and there is a large car park. It seems to be generally designed for young families as it has play areas. There is a strong emphasis on rotisserie chickens. Initial reports are fairly favourable. Regular beers are *Banks Mild* and *Banks Sunbeam, Marston's Pedigree* and *Ringwood Old Thumper*. All beers are served via tight sparklers which is a somewhat alien northern style in this area. www.poppyfieldspubmaidstone.co.uk

Swan, Maidstone – This continues to provide excellent quality *Shepherd Neame* beers with *Master Brew, Kent's Best* and *Spitfire* as regulars. A seasonal beer is also often to be found, *India Pale Ale* recently. Mini beer festivals occasionally happen and customers can vote for whichever of the list on offer they would like to be stocked. A simple selection of



hot food should soon be obtainable here. www.theswaninnmaidstone.co.uk

Marden Village Club, Marden – Now has a more liberal choice of guest beers with *Dark Star Partridge* and *Musket Flintlock* having been found joining the regular *Harveys Sussex Best Bitter* and *Shepherd Neame Master Brew Bitter*. Maidstone branch Club of the Year 2014.

Yew Tree, Sandling – Re-opened fully in mid-February following an 18-month period of closure. Now repainted internally and fitted with new double glazed windows and smart toilets. The front of house is run by Tracey with Jim and Tom in the kitchen. Tapas dishes can satisfy those not requiring the full works but the main menu has something for everyone and dishes can be adapted for children. On the bar were *Young's Bitter* and *Dark Star Hophead*, supplemented by *Nelson Friggin in the Riggin* as a guest. A fourth pump is expected to be fitted that will supply another guest ale from one of the local breweries. www.theyewtreesandling.co.uk

Queens Head, Sutton Valence – The beer quality here seems to have improved and as well as *Greene King IPA*, *Abbot*, *Morland Original* and *Hardys & Hansons Bitter* they also keep *Goacher's Fine Light Ale* as a regular. With the loss of the **Swan** some local drinkers may well have moved here and contributed to the throughput on the pumps. www.queens-head.net



Black Horse, Thurnham – On our visit we found it well supported with drinkers. *Adnams Southwold Bitter, Sharp's Doom Bar* and *Wychwood Hobgoblin* were on as guests but these change frequently from a list of regulars. *Westerham Grasshopper* is the regular ale. *www.wellieboot.net*

Bell, Ware Street – Branch members paid a long overdue visit here and found it to be quite vibrant with a darts match in progress and some diners still in the restaurant. Although a *Greene King* pub, apart from *IPA* there were *Belhaven Robert Burns* and *Thwaites Crafty Devil* that we were pleased to see and enjoy.

Railway, Wateringbury - Hit by the floods and closed; may be sold.

White House, West Farleigh – A welcome outlet for the local *Goacher's* ales. There is a fire in here winter and comfortable seating is provided. Facilities include a pool table, dart board and eight floodlit pétanque pitches. There are usually three *Goacher's* ales available straight from the cask.

George, Yalding – Closed due to flooding.

Walnut Tree, Yalding – Some shuffling of furniture here provides a few more seats in the lower bar area. Prices seemed to have gone up here but as long as beer is in good condition people will pay up. No doubt other establishments will soon be following with price rises subsequent to supplier increases but hopefully the budget will not provide even more. *Harveys Sussex Best Bitter Tonbridge* and *Coppernob* are regulars with *Exmoor Ale* as the single guest when the branch visited. A second guest will appear when demand increases.

Many thanks to those members who have begun scoring beers and offering feedback via *WhatPub.com*. It is of particular assistance to us in keeping up with those pubs that are away from the main population areas and hence less easy to get to. A good overview of all the branch pubs is welcome rather than lots of reports for the same pubs.

I happened to be enjoying a few beers in the **Flower Pot** when licensee David Davenport was being interviewed for StonesLive internet radio. StonesLive provides commentary and information about our home football team for those unable to attend matches. Well-known radio personality and Stones supporter, Roger Day, arrived during the afternoon as well. That was an unexpected plus for the interviewer as Roger was happy to participate. So to keep up with the Stones and various music genres, tune in via your PC, phone or tablet. www.stoneslive.co.uk

There have been a number of changes of licensee in the Dartford area of late. The **Fox & Hounds** in Lowfield Street closed on 27th February and a skip appeared outside on the forecourt so we feared the worst, as this was the sole remaining pub in Lowfield Street following the closure of the **Plough**, the **Windmill** and the **Two Brewers** in the last 15 years. Thankfully the pub re-opened the following week with a new landlord, Grant, previously of the **Bird in Hand** in Dartford Road. My colleague Bob Marsh called in to the **Fox & Hounds** on 10th March, which had *Sharps Doom Bar* and *Morland Old Speckled Hen* on sale, and a beer from a micro brewery would soon follow. Early days as yet, so we'll keep a weather eye on the pub, which has bar hours 12-11 Monday to Thursday, 12-12 Friday and Saturday and 12-10.30 on Sunday.

Grant said that the new people at **Bird in Hand** intend to maintain it as a family-oriented pub, which is good news, as we'd heard an unfounded rumour that it might have become a wine bar. Further along Dartford Road towards town, the **Ship** is now selling *Doom Bar* along with the longstanding *Courage Best*. This traditional cosy little locals' pub on the main road boasts the longest standing landlady in the area, so some good things remain the same.

Bob has also done some research on the 414 bus route along the Hawley Road. The **Papermakers Arms** in Hawley is another pub with new licensees, George & Lisa, who were in the process of moving in at the beginning of March. Only *Sharps Doom Bar* was available, but they are interested in real ale, and we've heard a rumour, this time from a reliable



source, that an expanded range of beers should include some exciting real ales. At the moment they do not serve food, as the kitchen needs a complete refit, but they hope to have it up and running for the summer. Currently the pub is open from 11-11 with 11.30 closing on Friday and Saturday. There is ample parking at the front and a large grassed beer garden to the rear.

We mentioned last time the *Millis* beers were no longer regularly available in pubs in its home village of South Darenth when, at one time, all three pubs stocked *Millis* beers from time to time. However *Millis* has found its way into the higher (or should that be lower?) echelons of society. *Millis Kentish Best* made its debut as a guest beer at the **Strangers Bar** in the Houses of Parliament on 28th January 2014, according to the local News Shopper, which carried a photograph of John Millis, his son Darren, and Dartford MP Gareth Johnson, supping the ale. John described *Kentish Best* as "a clean, malty ale, with a dry and fresh taste as well as a hoppy flavour". His other regular beers with local names are *Dartford Wobbler* and *Gravesend Guzzler*.

For the record, the **Jolly Millers** in South Darenth offers *Shepherd Neame Spitfire* and two guest beers, which were *Wadworth St.George & the Dragon* "coming soon" and *Canterbury Ales The Miller's Ale*, of which only the latter was available at the time. The **Bridges** offers *Doom Bar* and/or *Courage Best*, together with one or two guest beers, being *Wadworth Bumble Beer* at the time.

Another pub on the 414 bus route is the **Orange Tree** in Hawley Road, Wilmington, a *Shepherd Neame* tied house, just outside the Dartford town border. This pleasant pub, which will change hands in the near future, was refurbished recently, introducing a restaurant featuring a carvery, but we understand that the current licensees are struggling to make a financial success and have given notice to leave. Part of the problem could be the high rents and high stock prices charged by *Shepherd Neame* to their tenants resulting in higher than market average prices to the customer at the bar - or am I just being cynical?

We would like to commend one *Shepherd Neame* landlord, Mark Waters, who travelled back early from a day at the Cheltenham races to welcome our members at a social at the **Chequers** at Heaverham, where we enjoyed the regular *Shepherd Neame Kent's Best* and the seasonal beer *Early Bird*. Mark and Alexandra are coping in the current economic climate, but another downside



is the limited access to real ales from other breweries, so their large attractive garden is unlikely to become an attractive beer festival venue for real ale enthusiasts.

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That was perhaps a tenuous link to the approaching season for summer beer festivals, most of which are listed on page 3. In our branch area there are the long established events at the **Rising Sun** at Twitton, the **Jolly Drayman** in Gravesend and the **Dartford Working Men's Club**, recent additions of the **George & Dragon** at Swanscombe and the **Ship** in Southfleet, and new events at the **Windmill** in Gravesend and the **Cricketers** in Meopham. We may have omitted some so please always let us know in good time if your pub or club is hosting an event, which we will also promote on our website.

All of the "beer festival" pubs above have at least three handpumps dispensing good real ales throughout the year and most have been mentioned in previous dispatches. The **Ship** in Southfleet was visited recently and sells *Sharps Doom Bar, Adnams Broadside* and a guest beer, being *Timothy Taylor Landlord* at the time. Their Whitsun beer festival should include beers from various breweries in Kent including the local *Millis*.

In the previous issue I said that I'd "mislaid my notes" after visiting the **Plough** at Basted. Our "imperative" branch social took place in March and I can report that the pub sports five handpumps and Ben, the enthusiastic new landlord, regularly stocks Harvey's Sussex Best Bitter, St. Austell Trelawny and Tribute and two guest beers, which were the rugby themed



Caledonian Over the Bar and the tasty Thwaites Original Bitter. I'm looking forward to sampling the "good home cooked food" in the restaurant area which is open from 11.30-3pm; 6.30-9pm Monday to Saturday and from 12-5pm on Sundays.

On the same evening we paid a long overdue visit to the **Blue Anchor** at St.Mary's Platt, also near Borough Green. This is a *Greene King* tied pub, selling ales from across their range and subsidiary breweries. I enjoyed the rugby themed *Belhaven Grand Slam*. John, the landlord, runs a good guest beer policy, selling three real ales during the winter and monthly guests from other breweries, with *Black Sheep Best* and *Skinners Betty Stogs* on order, and four real ales in summer. *Weston's Old Rosie* cider is also available. Meal times are 12-2.30pm; 6-9.30pm Monday to Saturday and 12-4pm on Sundays.

I've added the **Plough** and **Blue Anchor** to my *Draught Copy* delivery run, and I shall also call again at the **Padwell Arms** at Stone Street, near Seal, which is just outside our branch boundary. I was pleasantly surprised here by the extensive range of real ales from small breweries in Kent. Only being allowed a half (driving – third pub) and being spoilt for choice, I thought of Felicity Kendal and went for the *Good Life*, brewed by *Goody's* from East Kent. I've been advised by friends that the restaurant meals are recommended, especially for those with a hearty appetite, as the portions are large to complement the large selection of beers.

Returning to my opening theme of changes of licensees in the Dartford area, it has been confirmed that Kelly and Chris Smith, from the **Paper Moon** in Dartford High Street, have become managers at the new Wetherspoons outlet in Sheerness, due to open later in the summer. Kelly has been working at the **Paper Moon** for about ten years and she has been the manager for six years, along



with husband Chris, and the pub has appeared in the *Good Beer Guide* for many of those years. Their last day will be Friday 16th May and the branch is holding a farewell social on Wednesday the 14th. Chris is still organising a trip to *Hogs Back* brewery Saturday 17th May and we hope that the new manager will continue the theme of brewery showcases and brewery visits. We wish Chris & Kelly every success in their new venture. Incidentally the new Wetherspoons in Sheerness will be called the **Belle & Lion**, apparently in memory of the first coaching inn in Sheerness, dating from 1843.

Finally the 2014 branch Pub of the Year award winner, announced on the 15th March, deservedly goes to the **George & Dragon** in Swanscombe, home of the *Caveman* Brewery. Congratulations again to Bob & Bron Veal for keeping up the standard for the second year running. The runner-up is the **Queen** in South Darenth, and third place goes to the **Robert Pocock** in Gravesend.

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Gravesend pubs....a 'river-side' walk

When the days are longer and evening sunshine creates a thirst, what better than to follow the line of the Thames, stopping now and then to watch the growing shadows and reflections of lights twinkling on the water, and salute the passing boats with a pint of *Betty Stogs*?

Well, such a walk is possible in Gravesend, thanks to the well-positioned collection of pubs that keep you close to the river and stretch from the top of town as far as the pub that many believe features in the dramatic final stages of 'Great Expectations' at the eastern end of town.

If you start at the **Somerset Arms** near the railway station, go on £2 Tuesday, a great price for a wide selection of ales. Crossing the road towards the river, and moving down to West Street, you can only wonder at the enormous number of pubs that once filled this area. However, the **Rum Puncheon** is there, a fine old building and much-appreciated purveyor of ales, with up to eight interesting cask ales, usually including the above-mentioned *Skinners Betty Stogs*. Here, at the pub's first floor terrace, is the first chance to sit outside and watch the river. Tempting as it is to stay put, one does not have far to go for similar

pleasures, as the **Three Daws** is 2 minutes away. This establishment is rightly famous for its traditional character, history and higgledy-piggledy collection of rooms. It now offers a vastly improved range of ales, including fine local beer from breweries in Kent. Once again, you have the option of sitting outside to admire the views of the old piers, as well as the passing traffic of enormous ships or humble tugs.



At this point, you can pop in to the **Clarendon** hotel / block of flats, which, to its credit, has set up a street-level / river-view bar and does offer a cask beer. However, if a more dedicated 'real ale' pub is your next stop, then a few minutes later you will be happy to arrive at the **Crown and Thistle**. You have moved a little more inland, but are in the heart of some lovely old buildings, which more than suggest the importance once

attached to this river-side town....a pier in front, a fort to the right and the once grand Georgian terraced Harmer Street to the left.

Admittedly, you will now struggle to both follow the river and drink well: best to move 'inland' for a short while and enjoy a drink at the **Jolly Drayman**, where one never seems to be served a bad pint. If tempted, break the walk at **TJ's**, a great town pub, with photographs of local riverside scenes, such as the old outdoor swimming pool. It usually offers a couple of good cask ales and a busy, friendly atmosphere.

Such would, for most, be sufficient for one evening, but one could walk it all off by heading out towards the famous **Ship and Lobster**, right by the river and providing one last chance to lean over the sea wall and watch the sun setting over the river up Dartford way, cranes and turbines towering in stark silhouette. And you can try to picture Pip and Magwitch creeping out from here to take that fateful boat trip..... For us, a taxi home is the best option.

We are all geared up for the 9th Bexley Beer Festival which will be held between the 15th and 17th May at the Old Dartfordians Club in Bourne Road, Bexley. We hope to have a massive turnout to drink all the extra beer that has been ordered in light of the sell-out last year.

In pub news, we have had no further information on the application to build on the **Wellington** in Crayford, and we have lost another pub with the closure of the **Jolly Farmers**, also in Crayford. In Sidcup, the **Metro Bar** has changed its name back to the original **Iron Horse** and has started selling *Doom Bar*. This is a real ale gain for the area. In Foots Cray, the **Seven Stars** looks as though it is ready to re-open. The bar has been remodelled and is equipped with two handpumps. Hopefully they will be in use when the time comes.

Our Pub of the Year voting has taken place and the results were as follows: Winner – Door Hinge, followed by the Wrong 'Un and the New Cross Turnpike. In total, 9 pubs received votes from the 20 members who took the time and trouble to vote. The Old Dartfordians Social Club was pronounced our Club of the Year on a unanimous vote. Our congratulations go to the respective licensees and steward involved.

Our winter meetings have been held at the **Charlotte** (Crayford) – January, **Earl Haig** (Bexleyheath) – February, and **George Staples** (Blackfen) – March. We'd like to thank the licensees for their hospitality.

Our social diary for the first quarter was thus: In January, we attended the opening of the London Brewers Festival at the **Wrong 'Un**, where we were able to sample beers from a range of London Breweries. There was also a meet-the-brewer session with James from *Hop Stuff*, a relatively new brewery based in Woolwich. We were treated to samples of both *Pale* and *Fusilier* together with sausage and mash. After that there was a quiz, in which we entered two teams with mixed fortunes, one team winning the competition whilst the other finished a lowly fourth of the six teams entered.

Our other social was to have been a cross-border social with South East London Branch starting at the **Black Boy**, which despite having a DA postcode is outside the Bexley Borough boundary and therefore not in our branch area. Our Secretary, Peter, discovered a couple of days

beforehand that they did not sell real ale, and so we decided to change the meeting point to **Sidcup Place**. Upon the arrival of Pubs Officer Ian, he discovered the pump clip turned round and upon enquiry learned that they were temporarily out of real ale. Further texts, e-mails and phone calls re-arranged the meeting point to the **Portrait** where we were met with the usual Wetherspoon range plus 6 guest ales and a couple of ciders. After a reasonable stay, we moved on to our original second destination the **Olde Black Horse**, where the choice was *Adnams Spiced* and *Broadside*, *Deuchars IPA*, *Courage Directors*, *Greene King Abbot* and *St Austell Tribute*, all at a 10% CAMRA discount, which is available at John Barras pubs.

There was no crawl in February, so instead we held our *Good Beer Guide* selection meeting at the **Furze Wren** in Bexleyheath. This was a fairly short meeting where the 16 pubs nominated for survey were briefly discussed before a vote was taken and the number whittled down to the required 7 entries, which will be declared once the guide is published.

In March, we tried to get our younger members actively involved by holding an age-specific social for those members under 30. It was held at the **Tailors Chalk** in Sidcup but sadly was attended by only one member, although three others did e-mail apologies to our social secretary for being unable to attend. We may try and hold another one at a later date. We also had a crawl around Upper Belvedere calling at the **Prince of Wales**, where we found *Youngs Bitter*, *Spitfire* and *Weltons Horsham Pale* available, whilst it appeared that the draught cider had run out. At the **Fox** we were greeted with *Bombardier*, *Youngs Bitter* and *Special*, *Doom Bar* and *Wadworth 6X*, and finally to the **Royal Standard**, where the beers were *Bass*, *Youngs Bitter* and *Ringwood 49er*. All the beers were found to be in good condition, and I must say that Upper Belvedere is certainly a good place to go for an evening's drinking because, apart from these three pubs, you also have the **Eardley Arms** and the **Victoria**.

We also held our first Saturday social of the year, a walkabout around Soho. Six members met at Charing Cross station at midday and proceeded to follow the walk as described in the *CAMRA London Walks* book (available from HQ). Our first port of call was the **Crown** on the corner of Brewer Street and St James Street. Here we were joined by the Social Secretary of CAMRA's West London Branch. Our steady afternoon of walking and drinking then took us around the area visiting

the following pubs: Ship, Dog & Duck, Three Greyhounds, Angel and ending in the Tottenham on the corner of Tottenham Court Road and Oxford Street.

Our summer programme of socials sees us taking trips both inside and outside the branch area. If you feel so inclined, please come and join us. See our diary on the inside back page for more details.

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

In this issue, we look at the pubs along route 23 from Maidstone. All of the pubs featured are within a short walk of a bus stop.

The 23 is run by Nu-Venture hourly for most of the day Monday – Saturday, but with no evening or Sunday service. The route runs from Maidstone in the north, through the Farleighs and Yalding.

The pubs in Yalding and Laddingford are also served by route 26, which runs two-hourly during the day. The combined service from Maidstone to Tovil is generally half-hourly. Please note that the last bus back to Maidstone leaves Laddingford at 16.51.

Explorer tickets are accepted on routes 23 and 26, but they cannot be purchased on Nu-Venture buses.

The timetable for route 23 can be found at *www.traveline.info*. Click on South East, then 'Find A Timetable', and, under 'location', put in the town or village of your choice along the route.

Full details of all the pubs mentioned, including last-known opening times, can be found on CAMRA's handy Whatpub – *www.whatpub.com*. It's best to check with the pubs beforehand, just in case you have to wait an hour for the next bus outside a closed pub!

The first pub reached outside Maidstone centre is the **Royal Paper Mill** at Tovil. Get off at the first stop after the bus turns off right downhill, walk back to the junction, turn right, then the pub is just across the road.

The **Royal Paper Mill** is one of two pubs owned by and tied to the excellent *Goacher's Brewery*, also in Tovil. Three or



four beers from the range are usually available in this typical traditional locals' pub.

Walk back to the same stop to catch the next bus. A five-minute journey brings you to the **Bull** at East Farleigh, with the stop a few yards beyond. This imposing Victorian pub normally sells *Harveys Best* and the ubiquitous *Sharp's Doom Bar*, and food is available.

The next pub along the route is the **Good Intent** at West Farleigh. Steve and Pauline will be pleased to sell you a pint of *Larkins Traditional* or the

guest beer, which could be anything, but often something out of the ordinary. A nice cosy pub, set back from the road. Food is available at lunchtimes, apart from Monday.

Leaving the **Good Intent**, the bus turns right and heads downhill. At the next junction it turns left for Yalding. Get off here to visit the **Tickled Trout**, a few yards to the right of the junction. This pub is mainly a restaurant, specialising in seafood, but three nationally available real ales are normally sold.



After winding through country lanes and a long descent of Yalding Hill, the bus passes the **Walnut Tree**, with a stop just beyond. This attractive 15th-century pub has a good reputation for food, and three or four real ales, which often includes one from a Kent micro such as *Westerham*.

A short walk through the village and across the bridge leads to the **George** on the left at the T-junction. This pub was up for sale late last year, and was badly affected by flooding in the winter, so it's worth checking the situation beforehand at this pleasant village local.

The bus route from this point becomes a clockwise loop through Benover and Laddingford back to Yalding and Maidstone. Benover has the **Woolpack**, a picturesque *Shepherd Neame* pub which is closed on Mondays. Three or four *Sheps* beers are usually available, plus food.

The bus waits for a few minutes at the next pub, the **Chequers** at Laddingford. This excellent pub is the hub of the community, and sells four real ales, with *Adnams* being a regular.

Food includes various 'themed' days each week, such as sausages on Thursdays. Charles and Tracey run a popular beer festival at the end of April.

The pub closes between 3 and 5 in the week, but an alternative route home after the last bus has gone is to walk along the footpath next to the Chequers, turn left on the lane (mind the traffic!), then Beltring Station is a short distance away, with hourly trains back to Maidstone.

This is a great route to reach several welcoming rural pubs but, given the limited number of bus journeys during opening hours, you will need to be a bit selective, or do it over two days!

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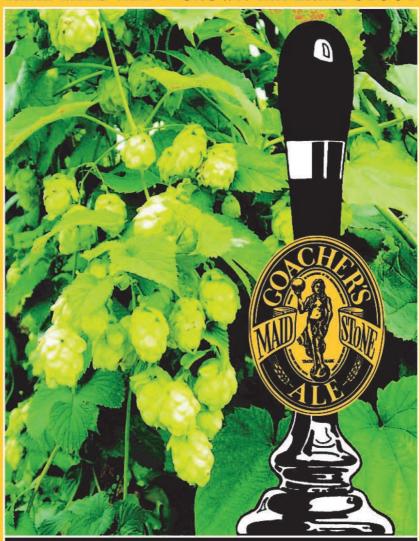
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
